4 First Aid Measures

Inhalation:

If inhaled, remove to fresh air. If not breathing, give artificial respiration. If breathing is difficult, give oxygen. Seek medical attention if breathing problems develop.

Skin Contact:

In case of skin contact, immediately remove contaminated clothing and wash affected areas with water and soap. If available wash with polyethylene glycol 400. Seek medical attention if symptoms occur.

Eye Contact:

In case of eye contact, hold eyelids open and rinse with water for at least 15 minutes. Remove contact lenses, if present and easy to do. Seek medical attention if symptoms occur.

Ingestion:

If swallowed, do not induce vomiting. Immediately rinse mouth with water. Give a glass of water. Never give anything by mouth to an unconscious person. Seek immediate medical attention.

Symptoms Caused by Exposure:

Inhalation: May be harmful if inhaled.

Skin Contact: May cause skin irritation.

Eye Contact: May cause eye irritation.

Ingestion: Harmful if swallowed. May cause nausea, dizziness and abdominal pain.

5 Fire Fighting Measures

Suitable Extinguishing Media:

Water fog, alcohol resistant foam, dry chemical, sand or carbon dioxide. Do not use full water jet.

Specific Hazards Arising from the Chemical:

Hazardous combustion products include oxides of carbon and nitrogen, hydrogen cyanide and hydrogen chloride.

This product is not flammable, but may burn or decompose in a fire.

Containers close to fire should be removed if safe to do so. Use water spray to cool fire exposed containers.

Special Protective Equipment and Precautions for Fire Fighters:

When fighting a major fire wear self-contained breathing apparatus and protective equipment.

6 Accidental Release Measures

Personal Precautions, Protective Equipment and Emergency Procedures:

Wear approved respiratory protection, chemical resistant gloves, protective clothing and safety boots. Evacuate all non-essential personnel from affected area. Do not breathe vapours. Ensure adequate ventilation. Extinguish all sources of ignition. Avoid sparks and open flames. No smoking.

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Environmental Precautions:

In the event of a major spill, prevent spillage from entering drains or water courses.

Methods and Materials for Containment and Cleaning Up:

Stop leak if safe to do so and absorb spill with sand, earth, vermiculite or some other absorbent material. Collect the spilled material and place into a suitable container for disposal.

7 Handling and Storage

Precautions for Safe Handling:

Use of safe work practices are recommended to avoid eye or skin contact and inhalation of vapours. Use only outdoors or in a well-ventilated area.

Food, beverages and tobacco products should not be stored or consumed where this material is in use. Always wash hands before smoking, eating, drinking or using the toilet. Wash contaminated clothing and other protective equipment before storage or re-use. Provide eyewash fountains and safety showers in close proximity to points of potential exposure.

Conditions for Safe Storage:

Store in a cool, dry and well ventilated area. Keep container tightly closed when not in use. Protect from extreme temperatures and direct sunlight. Protect from frost. Keep away from strong oxidising agents.

The product does not contain any relevant quantities of materials with critical values that have to be monitored at the workplace.

Additional toxicological information:

The Australian Acceptable Daily Intake (ADI) for imidacloprid for a human is 0.06 mg/kg/day, set for the public for daily, lifetime exposure. This is based on the NOAEL of 6 mg/kg/day, the level determined to show no effects during long term exposure for the most sensitive indicators and the most sensitive species.

The ADI for tebuconazole for a human is 0.03 mg/kg/day, set for the public for daily, lifetime exposure. This is based on the NOAEL of 2.96 mg/kg/day.
